A stream is a body of water that is constantly running, received and presented to an end-user while being delivered by a provider. It has a current, confined within a bed and stream banks. Live streams require a form of source media, and are important as channels in the water cycle. With new compression standards and the status of the ongoing Holocene extinction, streams now play an important corridor role in connecting fragmented habitats and thus in conserving biodiversity.
